The bachelor of law education program includes at least 240 ECTS credits. per year -60 ECTS credits. Accordingly, the duration of the bachelor's program is 4 academic years. The academic year is based on the semester principle. One semester includes 20 academic weeks, therefore the academic year is planned for 40 weeks. 1 ECTS credit is equal to 25 hours, which includes both the student's contact time (lecture, seminar, practicum, etc.), as well as his independent work (for midterm and final evaluation, as well as hours for homework preparation and presentation).

After the expiry of the Bachelor of Law educational program, a student with academic debt has the right to continue studying for additional semesters (not more than 4 semesters) in order to complete the educational program, while maintaining the status of a student.

The 240 ECTS credits of the undergraduate law education program are distributed as follows:

- Mandatory courses of the main field 164 ECTS credits;
- Optional courses of the main field of study 36 ECTS credits;
- Component aimed at the development of practical skills 6 ECTS credits;
- Free component 34 ECTS credits (25 ECTS credits are allocated to foreign languages (English language) module, and 9 ECTS credits to non-specialization courses).

#### Prerequisite for admission to the program

A person with a state certificate/certificate confirming complete general education or a document equivalent to it, based on the results of the unified national exams, has the right to enroll in the undergraduate law education program.

Without unified national exams, the admission/enrollment of students to the undergraduate law education program is carried out in accordance with the applicable legislation.

## The purpose of the undergraduate program

The goal of the Bachelor's in Law educational program is for the student to acquire:

- Broad theoretical knowledge of the main features, principles and institutions of the national legal system, sources of Georgian law, general legal principles, values, as well as national and foreign scientific opinion and legislation;
- In-depth knowledge in public, private, international and criminal law fields.

The purpose of the Bachelor's in Law educational program is to enable the student to:

- pay attention to legislative changes, court practice and scientific innovations, as well as the ability to communicate, constantly update knowledge and learn;
- effectively use the knowledge gained in the field of law in practical activities and other skills necessary for specialized activities;
- independently solve legal problems in the field of law, as well as the necessary skills to evaluate, analyze, reason, justify, and solve problems;
- strive to establish professional ethics and legal values;
- protect justice, human rights, social and democratic values during practical activities in the field of law.
- critically understand theories and principles and the ability to understand complex issues of law;
- transmit information in Georgian and foreign (English) languages to specialists and non-specialists in oral and written form;
- creatively use modern information and communication technologies;
- have the ability to participate in the process of formation of values characteristic of professional activity and strive to establish them;

#### Learning outcomes of the program

#### Knowledge and understanding

After completing the Bachelor's in Law educational program, the student:

- A. Describes legal systems and basic principles, basic theories of courses, historical sources of Georgian law, classification of legal norms, national legal system and hierarchical logic, including aspects of the relationship between national and international law, private, criminal, public, international law systems, concepts, fundamental principles and features of regulation, litigation issues, the role of judicial law in the dynamics of law development, law-making process.
- B. Describes the principles of state organization, the peculiarities of the constitutional subjects and bodies and/or their functioning, the legal bases of the implementation of local self-government, the forms of activity of administrative bodies that insure the protection of human rights and freedoms, and at the same time limit legal principles and instruments.
- C. Determines the issues of applying the law/norm, checking the basis of the request in order to resolve legal conflicts, determines the causes, characteristics of legal disputes and the ways of solving them by legal means.

#### Ability

After completing the Bachelor's in Law educational program, the student:

- $\mathbf{\phi}$ . identify legal problems of various nature (defective legislative regulation, difficulty of applying laws in practice and enforcement of decisions, etc.) in various fields of law, evaluates problems based on critical understanding and multifaceted/complex vision and develops ways to solve them .
- **g.** seeks and identifies the information (in Georgian or foreign languages), normative bases, national or international sources and court decisions, the use of which is essentially important and profitable for the purpose of solving specific legal conflict cases and/or legal disputes.;

studies and analyzes legal documentation, plans conflict/dispute resolution process (judicial and non-judicial), prepares legal/procedural documents and projects of a practical nature, develops substantiated positions, and finally implements professional/legal/consultative actions in compliance with ethical norms and a pre-developed strategy.

**3.** argues and shares opinions, visions, recommendations with appropriate legal language using various forms of communication (oral, written) and information-technological means, is able to convince others of the correctness of his opinion. At the same time, they listen to the arguments of others and can participate in the formation of a common vision based on the principle of teamwork.

#### Responsibility and autonomy

After completing the Bachelor's in Law educational program, the student:

- **%**. demonstrates the ability to self-develop, update knowledge, follow legal/legislative news, independently, at the same time, in cooperation with others, conduct development-oriented activities and identify further learning needs.
- $\boldsymbol{\sigma}$ . recognizes and protects the supremacy of human rights, the principles of litigation and procedural justice, the importance of carrying out professional activities with ethical values.

#### Areas of employment

A graduate of the Bachelor's of Law educational program will have the opportunity to work in any position where the academic degree of Master of Law is not required and/or it is not necessary to pass the state certification exam and/or additional prerequisites are not provided by the legislation of Georgia.

A graduate of the Bachelor's of Law educational program can be employed in legal practice:

- in legislative and executive authorities;
- in judicial bodies;
- in law enforcement and other controlling bodies;
- in corporate structures;
- in legal entities under public law and/or in non-entrepreneurial (non-commercial) organizations.

## The possibility of continuing education

Graduates of the Bachelor's of Law educational program have the right to continue their studies at the master's program, which is focused on the training of a specialist (judge, prosecutor, lawyer) and researcher at the next level.

Enrollment in the Bachelor's of Law educational program on a mobility basis is possible twice a year, within the deadlines set by the director of the National Center for Educational Quality Enhancement, following the mandatory procedures and rules established by the university.

Enrollment in the Bachelor's of Law educational program, or transfer enrollment from a recognized higher educational institution of a foreign country, is carried out based on the decision of the Ministry of Education and Science of Georgia.

Those wishing to study in the program must pass one of the foreign languages: English, or Russian, or French, or German.
