Program Volume in Credits	

Bachelor's Program in Georgian Philology consists of 240 ECTS credits, 60 ECTS credits per year, 30 ECTS credits each semester. Accordingly, probable duration of the program lasts for 4 year. Each academic year consists of 21 teaching weeks, accordingly in a year – 42 teaching weeks. 1 ECTS credit totals 25 credit hours that together with students' contact hours (classes, seminars, practical works, etc.) includes independent working hours (for midterm and final grading as well as credit hours for preparing homework and presentations).

After expiring of the Bachelor's Program in Georgian Philology, students with academic debt are able to continue their studies for additional semester (not more then 4 semesters) in order to complete the educational program.

Out of 240 ECTS credits 190 ECTS credits are allocated for the mandetory subjects, among which 25 ECTS credits are allocated for general subject, 20 ECTS credits are allocated for English language, 145 ECTS credits are allocated for the field and professional mandatory subjects and the rest 50 ECTS credits are for field elective subjects that can be chosen from 125 ECTS credits. including 10 ECTS credits for bachelor Thesis. 30 credits are allocated for professional concentration and 30 credits are allocated for elective subjects. Out of 240 ECTS credits students can choose 20 ECTS credits (by replacing subjects from elective module) as a free credit.

**Program Admission Precondition** 

- A person possessing a full general education is entitled to study at the Georgian Philology program.
- $\rightarrow$ —The precondition for the admission to the educational program is to pass the Unified National Examinations (
- ▶ The Unified National Examinations are conducted by LEPL National Examination Center.
- Exceptions to the general rule of enrollment in higher education institutions shall be permitted only in case provided by Georgian legislation.
- In case of a student's willingness to transfer to the School of Social Sciences and Humanities of the Caucasus University from another higher education institution, the request is studied and the final decision is made in accordance with Georgian legislation. The Student is enrolled in the Caucasus University according to the order of the President of Caucasus University.

# Qualification Description of the Bachelor's Program in Georgian Philology

Program Objective	The bachelor's degree program in Georgian Philology of Caucasus School of Humanities and Social Sciences aims to train specialists with modern knowledge and professional skills in Georgian Philology. In the program, the principal issues of Georgian Philology will be integrated into the humankind's spiritual culture and will be learned along the issues of the languages and literature of the peoples of the world, which helps develope the students' analytical and critical thinking skills to ensure that they will be able to understand the main issues of the Georgian language and literature in the global context.
	More specifically, the goal of the undergraduate program in Georgian Philology is to provide the student with scientific knowledge on key issues of artistic-aesthetic, historical-cognitive processes of Georgian and world literature; The ability to analyze and critically evaluate the works; To introduce literary processes in the context of the history of world literature; To study the Georgian language structure and linguistic theories; The ability to analyze linguistic sources; To learn the basics of classical languages.
	The structure of the program entails mandatory and elective subjects which will guarantee on one hand the complete assimilation of the knowledge and skills of a specific field, and on the other hand, offer the students a block of elective subjects that will satisfy their professional interests and will create a foundation for their future practical or scientific activities.
	The aim of the undergraduate program in Georgian Philology is to provide students with a broad theoretical knowledge of the main features, principles and values of the field, as well as future trends in the development of modern philological science.

#### Evaluation System of Student's Knowledge

The aim of the evaluation is to assess to what extent the learning outcomes prescribed by the syllabus are reached. The student's evaluation consists of multiple components and evaluates the course goals and learning outcomes by applying measurable criteria and appropriate rubrics. The student's evaluation is based on four major principles: objectivity, trustworthiness, validity and transparency.

The students are evaluated according to two sets of evaluation: summative and formative. The aim of the summative assessment is to accurately evaluate the student's performance. It monitors quality of learning and the level of the student's achievement in relation to the goals set by the course. The formative assessment is oriented on the student's

development. It gives students appropriate feedback on their achievements.

The evaluation system includes 100 points and envisages:

- a) Five types of positive grades:
  - a.a) (A) Excellent 91-100 points of assessment;
  - a.b) (B) Very good 81-90 points of maximal assessment;
  - a.c) (C) Good 71-80 points of maximal assessment;
  - a.d) (D) Satisfactory 61-70 points of maximal assessment;

a.e) (E) Sufficient – 51-60 points of maximal assessment;

b) two negative grades:

b.a) (FX) Did not pass – 41-50 points of maximal assessment, which means the student needs to work harder and is allowed to retake the exam one more time after working independently;

b.b) (F) Fail -40 points or less of maximal assessment, which means the student's work is insufficient and he/she has to retake the course.

Students are awarded credits on the basis of the final evaluation comprising the scores of the interim and final exam assessments.

The attainment of student's learning outcomes considers the interim and final evaluations, for which relative proportions out of the total score (100 points) and a minimum competence level are allocated. Namely, out of 100 points, the interim results are allocated 70 points, while the final exam results are 30 points. In interim evaluations the minimum competency barrier to be reached is 59%. The interim evaluation includes assessment components, the total of which is 70 points. For each assessment component, the evaluation is based on the pre-determined learning goals, task-oriented clear criteria and the learning rubrics drawn on their basis. In the interim results the student has to accumulate at least 59% of the 70 points to be allowed to take the final exam. The student's final examination is passed, if he/she gets at least 60% of the total 30 points.

In case the student fails to overcome the minimum competency barrier of the final exam, he/she is allowed to retake the final examination. The student shall retake the final exam within the period prescribed by the academic calendar no later than 5 days after announcement of the results of the final exam.

In case the student totally scores 0-50 points or fails to overcome the minimum competency barrier set for any form of the evaluation (Interim/Final exam), he/she shall be given a grade of "F-0".
