Over the course of his career, he has worked in the Department of State Representation in International Courts at the Ministry of Justice of Georgia, at the Embassy of Georgia to the Kingdom of the Netherlands, and in the Department of International Law at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Georgia.

He currently serves as Senior Adviser at the Permanent Mission of Georgia to the United Nations in New York. He has been involved in inter-state cases brought by Georgia before the European Court of Human Rights, including *Georgia v. Russia (II)* and *Georgia v. Russia (IV)*. He also has experience in the negotiation of bilateral and multilateral international treaties, participation in various international legal and diplomatic processes, and cooperation with international organizations and international courts.
